Paul Franklin

Paul Franklin didn't set out to become a hero, much less one of "Canada's Heroes", as TIME magazine calls him. A former medic with the Canadian Armed Forces, Franklin was nearly killed in Afghanistan in 2006 when a suicide bomber smashed into his vehicle, killing a Canadian diplomat. Franklin lost both of his legs, but he survived. At home, he made national headlines, becoming a symbol of the resilience and unheralded work that Canadian soldiers, hardworking men and women, are doing to bring stability to a volatile region. Against incredible odds, and after twenty-six surgeries, he began walking on artificial legs and rebuilding his life in Canada.

In the fall of 2009, Franklin retired from the military, where he previously taught medicine at bases across the country. He now works at the organization he co-founded, the Northern Alberta Amputee Program, which helps improve the lives of amputees (its national initiative is called The Franklin Foundation). He is also the subject of *The Long Walk Home*, a critically acclaimed book by Liane Faulder, and has become a popular repeat guest on CBC's *The Hour*.

The Long Walk Home

In his keynotes, Franklin shares stories about the work he and his fellow soldiers were doing in Afghanistan. Whatever your feelings on Canada's involvement, he brings an articulate, non-polemical and rarely glimpsed human element to discussions of our mission. With affable charm and perspective, he also talks about the infamous bombing, about how a combination of improvisational teamwork, mental toughness and vigorous training kept him alive. At the core of his talk is the immense hope he held onto, even when things looked bleakest, to see his family and to be able to walk his son to school every morning.

Steven Lewis

Steven Lewis is a health policy and research consultant based in Saskatoon, and Adjunct Professor of Health Policy at the University of Calgary and Simon Fraser University. Prior to resuming a full-time consulting practice he headed a health research granting agency and spent 7 years as CEO of the Health Services Utilization and Research Commission in Saskatchewan. He has served on various boards and committees, including the Governing Council of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, the Saskatchewan Health Quality Council, the Health Council of Canada, and the editorial boards of several journals, including Open Medicine. He writes frequently on topics such as reforming and strengthening medicare, improving health care quality, primary health care, regionalization, and health policy and politics.

Western Development Museum

The Western Development Museum is the keeper of Saskatchewan's collective heritage. The Museum shares the province's unique sense of place with all people for their understanding and enjoyment – recognizing that the legacy of the past is the foundation for a sustainable future.

Saskatchewan boomed with economic activity from the turn of the century to 1914. Land-seekers flooded the west and towns grew almost overnight. 1910 Boomtown, the Western Development Museum's representation of a typical Saskatchewan town, captures the atmosphere and style of this bustling period. Over 30 buildings portray community life - from the general store overflowing with everything from nails to gingham, to the blacksmith shop ringing with the sound of the hammer striking the anvil. Transport yourself back to a time when the clip clop of horses filled the air. You don't just visit this museum, you live it!

With its beginnings in the mid 1940's, the Saskatoon WDM is now noted for its indoor recreation of a 1910-era "boomtown". Boomtown consists of actual buildings from the era and recreations, including a homestead, police station, bank, newspaper office (with working printing press), saddle shop, general store, dentist's office, drug store, blacksmith (operational), and a church to name a few. The museum also includes displays of vintage automobiles and farm equipment.

The WDM offers training courses aimed at preserving traditional crafts and skills – Steam Traction Engine Operation, Blacksmithing Course, Wheelwright Course, and a Buggy Seat Upholstery Course. WDM has hosted harvesting demonstrations for Saskatoon area students for over 30 years. A children's summer camp allows children to experience the work and play of the pioneers – baking bread, making butter & ice cream, daily chores and pioneer games, stories and crafts. The WDM hosts a Halloween "BooTown"

evening, and is the home of the T. Eaton Co “Once Upon a Christmas”, originally built by the Eaton’s company for its Winnipeg store.

According to a national survey by the Council for Business and the Arts in Canada, the WDM maintains more exhibit area than any other public museum in Canada, with 25,000 square meters (270,000 square feet) of enclosed space.

Volunteers perform many of the services within the Museum. In Saskatoon (2008-09) 36,833 volunteer hours were recorded.


U of S Houseband

Diefenbaker Centre & University of Saskatchewan Campus Tour

When John Diefenbaker became Chancellor of the University of Saskatchewan in 1969, he announced his intention to bequeath his papers, memorabilia, personal library, and Sir John A. Macdonald collection to his alma mater. The Diefenbaker Canada Centre located on our beautiful campus now houses these historical artifacts of Canada’s thirteenth prime minister. The archives, containing over three million documents, eight thousand photographs, and two major press clippings collections, provide a unique record of Diefenbaker’s life and of Canadian history.

The tour will take us through this historical centre and will be followed by a guided walking tour of the University of Saskatchewan campus including the Museum of Natural Sciences, many on campus galleries, the newly renovated College Building, various buildings and departments of interest, including stories and urban legends about the university’s history. It is recommended that you wear weather appropriate walking attire, as part of the tour will be outside.
